Binyam. Bethany. and little Moriah live in the sweltering heat of the Arizona desert. This was not necessarily their plan, as Binyam, known as Benji in the US, was born and raised in Ethiopia and moved to Israel for 3 years before meeting Bethany and moving to the desert. Bethany, who has lived in Arizona her whole life, met Benji during a church tour in Jerusalem. Israel. Cod individually confirmed to Benji and Beth that they were to be married in June 2018. They followed Cod's vision for their lives and got married in Arizona where Bethany's family lives. They had Moriah, their first baby, a year later. They are now pursuing Cod's plan for their lives through Live Out Hope.

THE MISSION IN ETHIOPIA

OUR MISSION BEGINS

July of this year, 2021, the vision for starting a nonprofit that serves those struggling in Ethiopia and around the world was born! Live Out Hope was a dream that Benji had since he was young, a dream that came out of seeing the mothers of Ethiopia who collect heavy bundles of wood well beyond their own weight to sell in the marketplace. It is common for mothers to make a living this way, and they sell their wood as firewood to bakeries and cafes. But it is dangerous work walking down a mountain with this load, and their earnings are too small to support their family. These women inspire us to live courageously and to do what Cod has called us to do. It is our desire to bring hope to Ethiopia in a way that will provide these mothers' families with enough earnings to support themselves and give their children opportunities that they may not have had otherwise.

THE MISSION IN ISRAEL

OUR CHILDREN NEED US

The Ethiopian Jews are going through a cultural crisis. Many Ethiopian Jewish parents are unable to speak Hebrew with their children, but their kids were born in Israel and only know how to speak Hebrew. This raises all kinds of problems.

- The children are forced to handle many of the adult responsibilities.The children lose out on a lot of the connection with their parents
- because they have no mutual language.
- Their families struggle to assimilate into Israel.
 Many children grow up to use drugs and experience depression and thoughts of suicide especially after enlisting in the military. It is
- expected for Israeli children to do so after graduating high school. • There are very few that have the skills to work outside of low paying service jobs

Our vision in Israel is for Ethiopian Jewish parents to be able to speak Hebrew and for their children to have the skills to be competitive in the Israeli job market. Our mission is to teach parents how to read, write, and speak basic Hebrew in two years. For their children, our mission is to enroll them in tech literacy classes that will provide basic computer skills all the way up to software development, each with an

Benji's real name is "Binyam" which translated into English is "Benjamin". But, ever since he moved to Israel, he let people call him "Benji" due to how many European and American tour groups struggled with his Amharic name "Binyam".
